General Guidelines for CMU

- Honesty and originality are crucial. Do your own work.
- Academic Integrity is taken very seriously at CMU and Academic Dishonesty of any form is not tolerated.
- Each faculty member may make their own policies; you must learn the appropriate behavior for each class.
- Professors are not afraid to fail large numbers for cheating, so you should take it seriously too.

- It is everyone's job to expect the proper culture with regards to Academic Integrity at CMU and to be diligent in creating and maintaining this culture.

More Additional Thoughts

From faculty, staff, students, and alumni:

- Understand that change starts with the individual i.e.
 "For others to change, I must change.".
- It will take time, but you do need to make sure you change to the CMU culture right away. Do not violate Academic Integrity policies in any of your classes; this needs to start from Day 1.
- If academic dishonesty becomes entrenched in our CMU-Africa culture, it could lead to the failure of the entire program.
